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


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Canada's Provinces, Territories and Capital Cities

Canada is the second largest country in the world in size. Although Canada does not have one of the highest populations, it does have a lot of space! Canada is divided into ten provinces and three territories. The largest province is Québec and the province with the highest population is Ontario. The largest territory is also the newest, Nunavut.



The province that is the farthest east is Newfoundland and Labrador, and the province that is farthest west is British Columbia. Each province has its own flag, flower and motto. Ontario's motto is "Yours to Discover". The capital of Canada is the city of Ottawa, which is located in Ontario.




